




Perifereiako Lykeio Palaiometochou M.Koutsofta-A.Panagidi

- Location: Paliometocho, Nicosia, Cyprus.
- The school is named after two local heroes, Michalis Koutsouftas and Andreas Panagidis, members of the EOKA organization, who were executed by the British colonial authorities.
- It opened on September 1, 1997, with 13 teachers.
- Students are approximately 15 to 18 years old.
- The center has 25 classrooms, laboratories for Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Technology, Computer Science, Music, Art, Home Economics, History, Languages and more.
- It has modern sports facilities and a chapel dedicated to Saint Demetrius, built with a donation of a local.



















CULTURE DIFFERENCES

Cyprus and Spain share a Mediterranean spirit, but they differ in several cultural aspects. 
Halloumi

A semi-hard cheese made from goat and sheep milk, often grilled or fried.




Souvlaki



HUMAN RIGHTS ACTIVITIES

ACTIVITY 1

We divided into 2 groups to do the same activity.

Different characters were randomly distributed, they were from different origins, religions....

The teacher would ask a question related to the day to day or about what she could or could not do and we would take a step forward if our character would correspond and if not a step back.

At the end of the questions we looked at where we were in relation to where we had started.

To finish we paired up with the other group with the same character as yours and reflected on how to answer the same question and on the human rights violated and defended.



ACTIVITY 3

We painted Guernica in bright colors with the Cypriot students. This represents a more optimistic future where human rights are respected and the dignity of all people is valued, although the original work reflects the horror and suffering caused by war.

After our presentation on Guernica, we paired up and did a paper and poster on human rights and social justice activists. For example, Nelson Mandela, Marilyn Monroe...



ACTIVITY 4

You had a videocall with Safdar Ahmed, a Sydney-based artist, writer, and educator. He is the founder of the Refugee Art Project, which empowers asylum seekers and refugees through art. During the session, he talked about his graphic novel Still Alive, which highlights the experiences of refugees in Australia's immigration detention centers, blending journalism, history, and personal reflection to address human rights issues.

- The capital of Cyprus, Nicosia, is the only capital city in the world
- The flag of Cyprus includes the map of its territory, a historical landmark, since it was the first country to do so. Currently, only one other country has included the map on its flag, Kosovo.
- According to Greek mythology, Aphrodite, the goddess of love and beauty, was born in Cyprus. It was on the rock of the beach of Petra to Romiou. There are also several locations that follow in the footsteps of the goddess, such as the Baths of Aphrodite (Akamas) or the Paleopafos Site (Kouklia).
- Cyprus is home to the Larnaca Salt Lagoon, where colonies of flamingos can be seen.










CONCLUSION
